

Headnote Show Details First issued on 7 January 1831, The Essex Standard was published each Friday at a price of 7d. Conservative in orientation, its first issue proclaimed it was to be "...a Standard around which the loval, the religious, and the well-affected of our County may rally." The newspaper was at first printed in Chelmsford, but was acquired by John Taylor in September 1831 and thereafter printed in Colchester. Issue no. 189 of 15 August 1834 has four pages of seven

columns per page. It was published by John Taylor, Jr and Henry Thomas Riddell. Page three mentions the building of the Marguis of Bristol's seat at Ickworth, has a cricket report, and an article in the "Le Melange" heading offers the insight from The Frankfort Journal that the fields of Baden are overrun with 20,000 mice. ESSEX ADJOURNED SESSION.—The Adjourned Quarter Session for the county of Essex will be epened on Tucsday next, the 22nd inst. There are at present eleven prisoners for trial, charged as under:— located, but Smith evidently desired to get Brady outside, in order to give him an opportunity of attempting an escape, and, on being foiled in his endeavours, struck the officer a violent blow on the head. CHELMSFORD PETTY SESSION, FEB. 11 .- Before the Hon. A. Petre, in the chair; and J. A. C. Tabor, Esq.-In the case of James Gaywood, who had been summoned for game trespass on land of Mr. W. J. Beadel, of Springfield, Mr. F. A. Jones who had been instructed by Mr. Beadel to prosecute, said the prosecutor was satisfied with the assurances which had been given him that the offence would not occur again, and that really there was not so much blame attaching to the defendant as he at first imagined. Therefore, by leave of the Bench, he wished to withdraw from the information. - The summons was withdrawn accordingly.- Richard Dines, labourer, was charged with stealing three cabbages, the property of Messrs. W. and H. Marriage and Sons, at Writtle Park, his employers, at Writtle, on the 29th January .- Mr. Marriage said there had been so many cabbages stolen from his farm that he was obliged to make and example of prisoner. Still the value was very slight in this particular case, and he hoped the Bench would deal leniently with him.-Prisoner elected to be dealt with summarily by the Justices, and he was sentenced to 14 days' hard labour.
